Description of Course

Sewing and patterning methods used in theatrical costuming, covering the basics and beyond, using different machinery, stitching techniques, and patterning types.

Course Objectives

This course is designed to give both basic and advanced costume technology. At the end of this course the successful student will be able to:

- o Identify the costume shop personnel
- Understand the organization of the costume shop
- Recognize and understand the safe use of costume shop materials, tools and equipment
- o Identify the grainline of fabric
- o Understand the steps of a theatrical costume
- o Demonstrate a command of hand and machine stitching
- o Take accurate measurements of the body
- o Read and use a commercial pattern and envelope
- Understand a variety of patterning techniques

Production Assignment

This is to get involved with the university shows so you can see in a real world setting how a costume technician and costume shop runs. For this project you will be graded based on attendance and participation. You will be required to work 22 hours in the costume shop (2 hours a week). This work can be, but is not limited to, costume construction, hand sewing, costume crafts, organization, etc. You will schedule the day that you would like to work and are expect to be there the same day and time every week. You cannot make up a missed day but you may work ahead and complete your hours early.

Attendance

- Attendance is mandatory. Being present and receptive to the information and discussions in class is essential to the successful completion of this course. Each absence past two (2) will result in the lowering of you semester grade by .25 of a grade point for each day.
- Much of the work can be completed in class, however there will be a need to work outside of class in order to meet due dates.
