Description of Course

Principles of theatrical make-up techniques, including character analysis and practical application.

Course Objectives

- Intellectual Engagement: You will learn to think critically as you explore the relationship between the face and the character.
- Professional Excellence: You will learn tools that will form a basis for practicing the art of makeup for productions and for any future education in this area.
- Aesthetic Expression: You will learn how makeup enhances expression of character and will use various artistic skills to create and execute your designs.

Projects and Assignments

Schematics - For each make-up design you will turn in a schematic/application chart. This form is in color and acts as a form of instructions for the application of the make-up.

Character Analysis - Even though you will not be designing for specific plays during the course of the class, it is important to think in terms of character. For each assignment you will complete a brief written analysis for the character you

designing for. You will need to decide the following **before** you design the make-up for each character: Occupation, social status, education, age, health, culture, and personality.

Make-up Morgue - This is a collection of research images that will aid you in your make-up designs. For each application (excluding basic make-up) you will be required to have five quality images to inspire you. Unacceptable graphics are in black in white, poorly lit, or so small you can't see any detail.

Quizzes - There will be 11 quizzes given online on the desire to learn site. The lowest score will be dropped.

Final Binder/Album – This will have your schematics, character analysis, morgue pictures, and photos (taken by your instructor) for each application. They are to be organized by project in a chronological order. This will be due on April 27th before finals week. This is worth 200 points of your final grade.

Attendance

- O Attendance is mandatory. Being present and receptive to the information and discussions in class is essential to the successful completion of this course. Each absence past two (2) will result in the lowering of your semester grade by .25 of a grade point for each day.
- Much of the work can be completed in class, however there will be a need to work outside of class in order to meet due dates.
